"Truly, truly, I say to you, everyone who commits sin is a slave to sin." St. John 8:34

"It is certain that man must utterly despair of his own ability before he is prepared to receive the grace of Christ." Luther's Heidelberg Disputation of 1518, Thesis 18

One year after Luther posted his 95 Theses on the All Saints' Church in Wittenberg he was still searching for the Gospel among the authorities of his world. We on the other hand, have it all too easily; or do we? Some of the differences between our day and Luther's are stark. A focus on mass produced goods, electricity, refrigeration, and computers may make anything before 1900 seem like the dark ages. However, consider one thing we in the 21st Century have in common with Luther's 16th Century: universities. There was the struggle and drive to learn of God's creation (and achieve higher status/honor/wages) by education in more technical and varied forms of service. Besides this social/economic commonality, there was the government and the church: which we know as the left and right-hand realms of God's kingdom.

The rise of economic wealth between these five centuries may make the influence of both kingdoms seem diminished. Nevertheless, this change does not stop wars: both internal and external. Just as the Israelites allowed the pagan Canaanites and Philistines to remain and did not conquer all of their Promised Land (Judges 3), we also fail to follow God whole-heartedly and tend to compromise with evil: both within us and outside ourselves. Being a sinner also means being easily confused about what is evil. How does God expect me to love a sinner? Does it matter how I spend my time? How much do I really have to respect or obey authority?

Compromise is inevitable for sinners, especially for uncaring or uninformed ones. As slaves to sin, we depend on God to sustain our faith even if we do care and inform ourselves of His holy Word. Without His Holy Spirit, we turn Jesus into a teacher of earthly morals and not of the Truth that will outlast creation. The turning of our original transcendent God into a god of our world shows our slavery to sin and the weakness of our flesh. This is why Luther emphasized the disparagement of our ability and works when it comes to our salvation.

After Luther's rediscovery of the Gospel, the next problem was how sinner-saints grew to be experts at taking God and His Gospel for granted. Free grace means no work, right? In a certain way yes, but also no. As sinner-saints we are caught up in both of God's realms. As sinners, we will have affliction under God's continuing wrath against sin. All of our mistakes still have consequences. God still sustains this corrupt world with laws like gravity, reaping, and sowing. If a man does not work, let him not eat. (2 Thess. 3:10) It is an abuse of God and His gift of Baptism to disregard feeding one's faith. That is why our Confirmation Rite, (Lutheran Service Book pg. 273) repeats part of Holy Baptism (pg 268), and adds questions regarding your duty as a soldier of Christ.

- Do you intend to hear the Word of God and receive the Lord's Supper faithfully?
- Do you intend to **live** according to the Word of God, and in faith, word, and deed to remain **true to God**, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, even to **death**?
- Do you intend to continue **steadfast in this confession and Church** and to suffer all, even **death**, rather than fall away from it?

Those confirmed at St. John Lutheran Church who do not attend for years are not receiving the Lord's Supper faithfully. Due to our fleshly (and economic) sinfulness, we want to pay the least amount for everything. Why bother going to church if God already obtained our salvation? We go not for salvation, but because of our salvation. The eternal gifts God gives to His children begin even now because we as sinners will die, but saints live forever. On the other hand, God still allows Satan, the World, and our flesh to fight against our faith in Christ so that we may learn to defend our faith and glorify Christ and not our own works.

STEWARDSHIP CORNER

Sometimes people don't like it when pastors talk about stewardship. For some, it hits too close to home. It is easier to talk about bad people in Washington, in history, or overseas than it is to think about what our daily life in Christ is supposed to look like – how we are supposed to love our neighbor.

The fact that we don't like hearing about stewardship certainly means we ought to face it. Here are a few simple and practical realities.

God calls us to first-fruits, sacrificial giving. This means we should give off the top. We should set a percentage of our income as a deliberate gift for the work of the Church and give that first. We write the check to the Lord's work in the Church before we pay the mortgage or pay for our medicine or pay for anything else.

We don't pay for all the stuff we need, and think we need, and then give from what is left over. That is the first-fruits idea. It is hard because we think we need all sorts of other things first. But that is the point of "sacrificial."

Next, how could the starting point for Christian generosity and sacrifice really be anything less than a tithe -10 percent? The ceremonial law of the Old Testament was never arbitrary. In the Old Testament, the Levites received this tithe so they could be full-time ministers.

Does the New Testament have a ministry that is larger or smaller? It is far larger: "Make disciples of all nations" (Matt. 28:19). And we are still to have a full-time ministry: "The Lord has commanded that those who preach the Gospel should make their living from the Gospel" (1 Cor. 9:14).

So, if 10 percent was needed in the Old Testament, and we have a bigger mission need in the New Testament, how can we expect the Lord's work to be done on less than a tithe?

First-fruits, sacrificial, generous giving – that's the way. We shouldn't fool ourselves into thinking that we've out-given God's goodness or that we've given plenty.

We might be tempted to think so but consider – no one in the Church has given plenty because no one has given all. No one has died for his sins. Only the sinless Son of God did that.

Or, as St. Paul said, bringing the Good News of Jesus into the discussion of our giving to support the Lord's work in the Church:

"I say this not as a command, but to prove by the earnestness of others that your love also is genuine. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich" (2 Cor. 8:8-9).

As you can see, what the Bible commands about our stewardship can sting. It's law, and the law shows our sins. It calls us to repentance.

The law is meant to expose and accuse for the sake of showing us Christ and His fulfillment of the law. If first-fruits, sacrificial giving has you squirming, that's the point.

In Mark's account of the feeding of the 5,000, Jesus took the disciples' five loaves and two fish and blessed them. It was nothing among so many, but, of course, it was plenty. Jesus makes something from nothing.

Mark doesn't say that all the disciples gave Jesus all the bread they had. It is quite possible some of them held something back. But even if they did, that didn't stop Jesus from blessing them. Jesus makes something out of nothing.

He, who fed His people in the desert with Manna every morning, doesn't need their bread. But they need to give it. And what they give, however little it might be, however grudgingly they do so, He blesses it.

He not only blesses those whom He feeds with it, but He blesses them, the givers – not just in that they wind up with (a basket full for each loaf) but that they learned to trust and rejoice in Him.

The Lord gives, and the Lord takes away. The Lord gives abundantly or asks us to fast. We do not know what will happen. Blessed be the Name of the Lord.

He does all things well and works all things together for good. The disciples don't give their bread to Jesus because it is a good investment. They give it because He is good, they love Him, and they trust Him. Let us go and do likewise.
